

Kentucky Energy Communities







- The Energy Communities IWG has engaged with more than 1,300 stakeholders throughout the state.
- Since 2022, the Illinois Coal Basin and Eastern Kentucky Rapid Response Teams have supported the state's economic growth objectives.
- Kentucky is also part of the Waterways Freight Diversification and Economic Development Initiative, which is focused on revitalizing communities along the Ohio, Allegheny and Monongahela Rivers Corridor.

INVESTMENTS HIGHLIGHTS

Since 2021, Kentucky energy communities have been selected for more than \$1.9 billion in federal investments and more than \$2.3 billion in private sector investments.

- Investments from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development to help develop an affordable housing community in Hazard, Kentucky.
- The city built 15 homes on former mine lands to help solve the lack of affordable housing in the region.

- \$180,000 initial grant from the Delta Regional Authority to support a Lineman Training Program targeting displaced coal miners.
- Additional \$133,000 in public investment to expand the college's offerings to include training programs for diesel mechanics and commercial drivers.
